



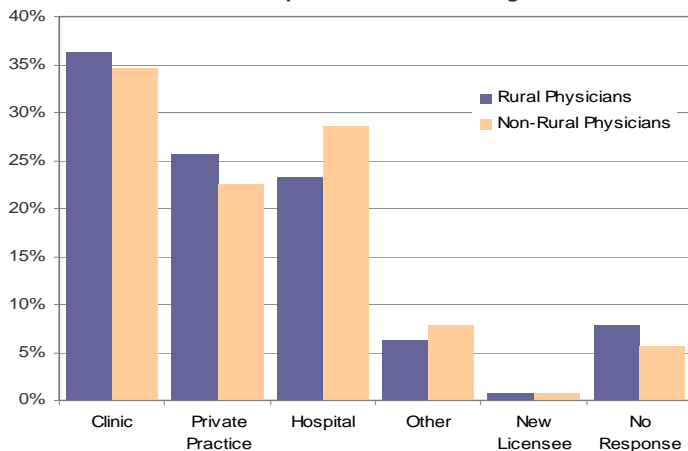
Profile: Oregon's Rural Physician Workforce, 2010

Quick Facts

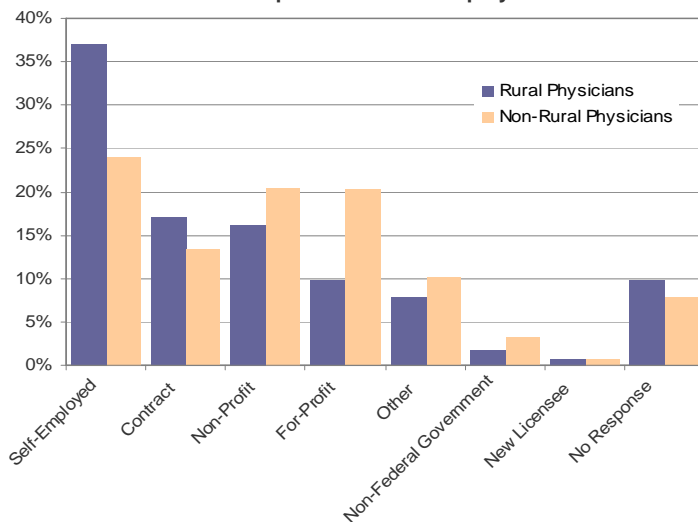
- The Oregon Office of Rural Health defines rural as those geographic areas ten or more miles from a population center of 40,000 or more.
- Nationally, 20% of the U.S. population lives in rural areas, while 9% of physicians practice there. In Oregon, 38% of the population resides in rural areas, while 19.9% of the state's physicians have a rural practice.
- The average age of Oregon's physician workforce is 50 years. The average age of Oregon's rural physician workforce is 52 years.
- Nearly 43% of rural physicians are 55 years of age or older compared with 34.3% of physicians in non-rural areas.
- Males compose 76% of the rural physician workforce compared with 67% in non-rural areas.
- Osteopathic physicians compose nearly 10% of the rural physician workforce, compared with 5% of the non-rural physician workforce.
- Primary care physicians are those who self-reported practice specialties in family medicine/practice, general practice, geriatrics, pediatrics, adolescent medicine, general internal medicine, or internal medicine with a subspecialty in geriatric medicine.

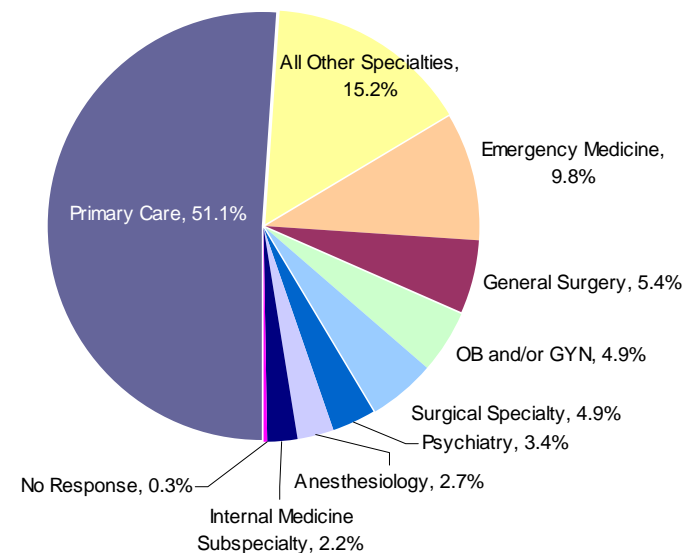
Self-Reported Practice Setting



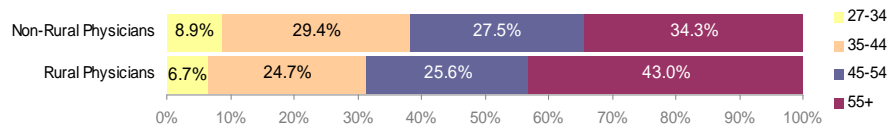
Self-Reported Form of Employment



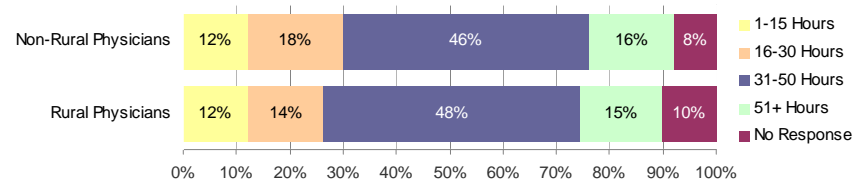
Self-Reported Practice Specialties of Oregon's Rural Physicians



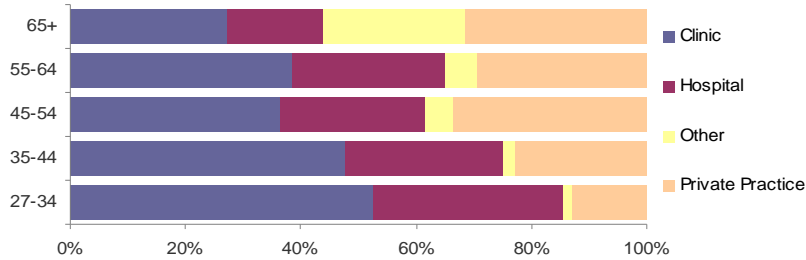
Age Distribution



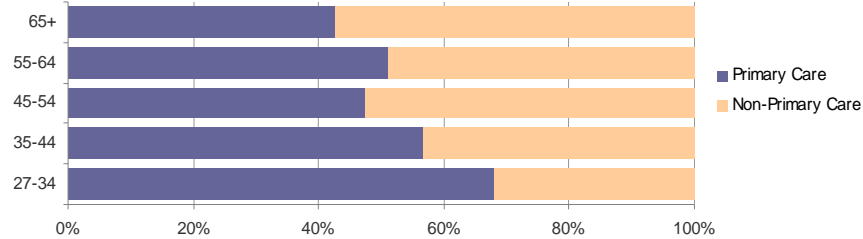
Self-Reported Average Hours per Week in Direct Patient Care Activities



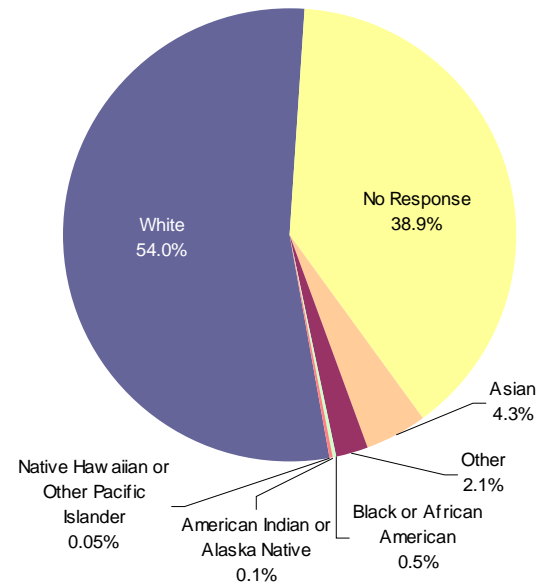
Self-Reported Practice Setting of Rural Physicians by Age Category



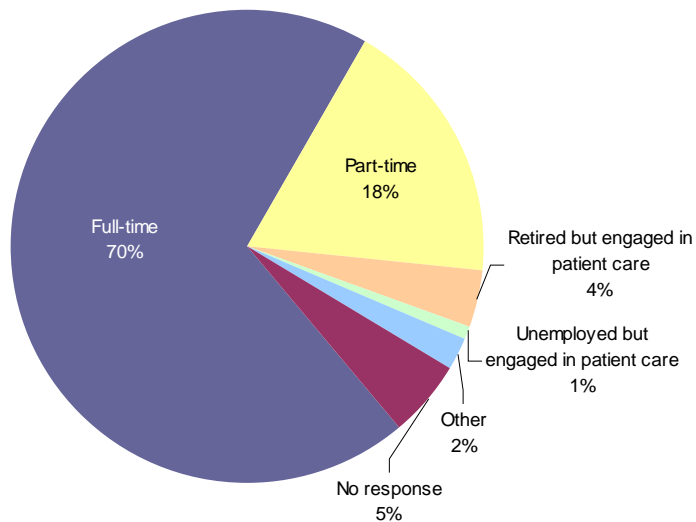
Percent of Rural Physicians Engaged in Primary Care by Age Category



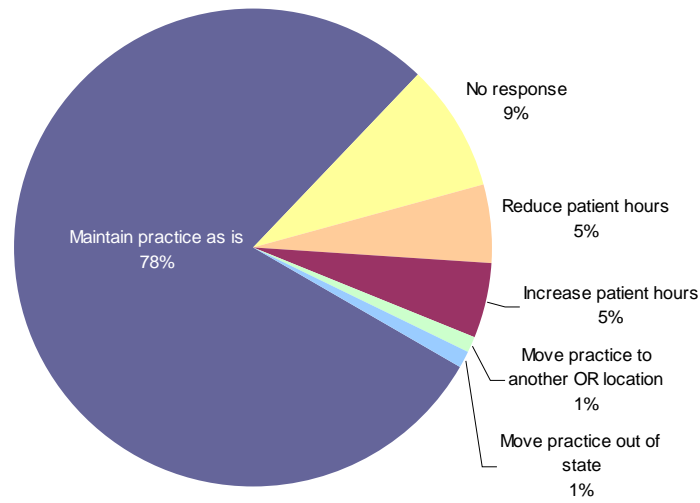
Self-Reported Race of Oregon's Rural Physicians

Self-Reported Future Practice Plans of Oregon's Rural Physicians (within two years)



- The population-to-primary care physician ratio in rural Oregon is 1,332:1. Statewide, the population-to-primary care physician ratio is 930:1.
- There is a higher proportion of primary care physicians among more recent medical school graduates practicing in rural Oregon; nearly 67% of rural physicians between the ages of 27 and 34 years old are engaged in primary care.
- Younger physicians in rural Oregon are more commonly practicing in clinics and hospitals.
- Over 83% of rural physicians reported that they plan to maintain or increase patient care hours within two-years, 6.3% reported they plan to decrease patient care hours or move their practice out of state, and 1.2% plan to move their practice to another Oregon location.
- Of rural physicians 55 years of age or older, 9.4% plan to reduce their patient care hours within two years.
- Over 7% of rural physicians in private practice settings plan to reduce patient care hours within two years.
